DANGER in Country-of-Origin	Many immigrants are deported back to countries where they face violence, abuse, and even death. For example, at least 138 people have been killed after being deported from the U.S. to El Salvador and an additional 70 others have been beaten, sexually assaulted, extorted, or tortured.	207
Lost PARENT	Tens of thousands of children in the U.S. lose a parent to deportation each year, with thousands more placed into the foster care system after their parents are deported.	201
COVID in Detention	U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, also known as ICE, has moved people from one immigration detention center to another without following COVID-19 protocols. As a result, some who caught COVID-19 while in ICE custody have been deported back to their respective countries of origin.	200
PAST Conviction	Despite living in the U.S. for many years, immigrants can still be deported back to their country of origin. For example, most deportation orders against Southeast Asian immigrants are for those who were convicted of crimes but completed their prison or jail sentences over 20 years ago.	193

VISION Act

There is currently a proposal in the California State legislature called the VISION Act. The VISION Act would ensure that an immigrant who is eligible to be released from a California state prison or a local jail would not be turned over to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) custody. This includes a person who has completed their sentence, been granted parole, had charges dropped, or been granted release by a judge. **Do you support or oppose the VISION Act?**

DOUBLE -punishment frame	The VISION Act will end the double-punishment of immigrant Californians, meaning immigrants who have served their time and have earned their release from prison or jail will not then be turned over to ICE custody where they are placed in detention and face deportation. Like any other Californian, immigrant Californians should be allowed to return to their communities and rebuild their lives after serving their time and earning their release from prison or jail.	254
COALITION frame	The VISION Act is supported by the California Democratic Party, the Latino Legislative Caucus, and the Asian Pacific Islander Legislative Caucus. It is also supported by over 90 organizations across California, including Black Lives Matter, as well as by the city and county governments of San Diego, San Francisco, Oakland, and Santa Ana.	261
CRIMINALITY frame	The VISION Act would release criminals back onto our streets, including those convicted of violent crimes or sex crimes. Some believe that immigrants who commit crimes should not be deported. However, if they are not deported these criminals would be allowed to return home and would be released back into our communities, which threatens our public safety.	229
